First Reading

Acts of the Apostles 10:34. 37-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles



We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses – we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the

dead – and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

Gospel John 20:1-9

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John The teaching of scripture is that he must rise from the dead.

It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved. 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb' she said 'and we don't know where they have put him." So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first: he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground. but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into

the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over his head; this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went in; he saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead.



Fr Michael's Easter Message 2025

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I wish you all a happy and a blessed Easter. Easter has always been the central Christian feast. It is a significant feast for most Christian faiths, and a time of great joy, renewal and hope.

During Easter, we celebrate Jesus rising from the dead after His terrible death. In its simplest form, Easter reminds us that, through Jesus, we too are given new life. No matter the burdens we carry or how dark our world seems to be, Christ's resurrection is the promise that light will always overcome darkness.

In line with the theme of the Jubilee Year 2025, we should be "pilgrims of hope" carrying the message of Easter to others. When Jesus died, which we remember on Good Friday, hope seemed lost for His followers. Jesus was promised to be "the hope of the world" Mt 12:21. Jesus was hung on the cross and buried in a grave, but three days later, He rose from the grave, overcoming death.

The Friday on which Jesus died is called Good Friday. One may wonder why 'good' when it brought doom and sadness? This is because, from His death, there came wholeness and the promise of eternal life, a new beginning. In His death, there was forgiveness of our transgressions. Jesus gave His life in place of ours. On the cross, He took the brokenness and sin of all humanity upon Himself, and in exchange offers us his righteousness - that is, right standing with God. That's why we call Good Friday, 'good'. It was a Friday that brought hope and joy.

The Easter story does not end on Friday, with Jesus' crucifixion and death. The miseries of his followers turned to hope when He rose to life on the following Sunday (Easter Sunday). With the theme of this year, Jubilee of Hope, the Easter message reminds us that we are not alone, and there is hope and renewal in our world, which is faced with many uncertainties.

Even though sometimes we are stifled by all kinds of challenges, and we feel overwhelmed by political situations, climate aberrations, economic instability, pandemic uncertainty, poverty, violence and other dangers lurking around every corner of our lives, the Easter message reminds us that we are not alone. Christ has conquered death, and His victory is our hope.

Borrowing Patrick O' Reagan, Archbishop of Adelaide's words, "As a Church, our mission is to be bearers of hope and peace to others". We are called to be a welcoming community, where everyone finds hospitality, hope and above all love.

May this Easter fill your hearts and homes with the radiant joy of the Risen Christ. Once again, I wish you all and your family a Happy Easter.
